

On April 24, 2023, after a short time in hospice care, Sister Laura Filipas died quickly, peacefully, and unexpectedly. After 88 years of loving her family and then her religious community, she passes on that legacy of love to all of us. Some years ago, in creating a document that might be called a spiritual will, Sister Laura wrote, "I am a teacher to the marrow of my bones because I love to learn and share, but intellect and knowledge without love and understanding is nothing. Any success I may have achieved, any good I may have done for others, was inspired by my familial and Franciscan ancestors. This is the love I leave, to live on in you who read these words."

On May 28, 1934, Laura Ann Filipas was born in Chicago to Croatian parents, Pearl (Bogdanic) and John J. Filipas, both of whom had been born in Austria. She was their youngest child and was welcomed into a family of three brothers and one sister. They were raised in Sacred Heart-Englewood parish in Chicago. At her 25<sup>th</sup> Jubilee, Sister Laura described her entry into the Joliet Congregation as a kind of home and Community affair. She recalled with amusement driving herself, her mother, and Sisters Francella and Celestine to Joliet the day she entered. Her companions then had to wait for a return trip to Chicago until her brother, after work, could travel to Joliet by bus to chauffeur them home.

Receiving the name Sister Claude, she grew close to her classmates. Her novice mistress, Sister Solana, in 1953, described Sister Claude's character as "pleasant and wholesome personality, open and sincere, considerate of others, charitable, responsible, outspoken, independent at times, a very capable student." Later, Sister Claude would describe her classmates as being very close-knit in the postulancy and novitiate. She said, "Just before First Profession we said among ourselves, 'Eighteen or nothing!''' then one novice left and Sister Claude had to reassess, so she decided "One or nothing!" because if everyone else left, she was certain she was called to be a Joliet Franciscan.

Sister Laura (the baptismal name she returned to after the Second Vatican Council) felt and expressed gratitude for the closeness and support of classmates and Franciscan friends while they grew and changed according to Vatican II insights. In 1997, she said, "Whatever good has been done in the various ministries I have experienced has been done as a Joliet Franciscan...a spirit that has carried me through since the day I realized I needed to stay."

Those ministries included teaching, prayer, spiritual

direction, administration, and pastoral work. Her first fifteen years were spent in elementary and secondary education. From teaching in primary grades in Illinois, she went on to teach English in Illinois and Ohio high schools. As high school principal, she had the sad responsibility of closing St. Mary's in Columbus.

After her ministry in schools, Sister Laura answered the call to be a founding member of the Congregation's House of Prayer. She spent ten years at this House on the Kankakee River, praying, reading, studying the Bible, communing with nature, and welcoming people from the area who came for spiritual direction and renewal. In 1974, she evaluated that ministry saying that it was a good time of service for her because the nature of such a life emphasized prayer and close community living. The time for reflection helped her feel more competent when others approached seeking help.

Answering another call, Sister Laura agreed to return to Joliet to spend four years as a co-administrator at the Motherhouse. She said that experience increased her gratitude and admiration for our senior Sisters. While ministering there, she also stayed tuned to issues concerning the world and the Church. Two letters, addressed to an archbishop and a cardinal in the spring of 1983, are a testimony to this. She expressed her stand for non-violence when she commended Joseph Cardinal Bernardin of Chicago for his interview discussing the Pastoral Letter on War and Peace, and she prodded both him and Archbishop Weakland of Milwaukee to continue research regarding the role of women in the Church. Her letters were passionate and respectful. Sister Kathleen Rossman, her Coordinator at the time, wrote in Sister Laura's file, "I think this speaks to who she is and I'm proud of her."

After 1983, Sister Laura moved on to parish work and spent many years directing, teaching, and forming adults. She taught classes, scheduled speakers, guided scripture study, facilitated a program for alienated Catholics who wanted to come home, held convocations with other parishes and met one-on-one with many parishioners. At the time of her 50<sup>th</sup> Jubilee in 2004, Sister Laura described teaching as a lifelong joy. "I learn so much from my students," she said. "That's the delight of teaching: one is constantly learning too."

When Sister Laura had the opportunity to go to Assisi in

1980, she came home with some new understandings of St. Francis and St. Clare. Those understandings came to be reflected in her own life: respect for the uniqueness of each individual, encouragement of others, awareness that conversion is an on-going process, courage in living convictions in the face of opposition, and concern for the poor. As she highlighted these in her "log," she showed us again who she is.

We bless you on your way, dear wise and witty, gentle and kind Sister Laura. Thank you for your legacy of love. Alleluia! Alleluia!
