Synthesis of Key Insights, Strengths, Opportunities, Limitations/Weaknesses, Threats, and Where the Spirit is Leading Us

Key Insights:

- **Care and Concern for the World:** Be active in addressing local and global issues and concerns.
- **Role as Ecclesial Women:** Emphasize the importance of our presence and interactions within the church and among members of the faith communities to which we belong.
- **Franciscan Presence:** Focus on being present and listening to others.
- **Embracing Change:** Acknowledge the challenges involved and necessity of change.
- **Community and Support:** Sustain a sense of love, care, mutual support.
- **Franciscan Spirit:** Make it evident in actions and support for each other.
- **Grieving Our Losses:** Grieve together, holding fast to memories that are a source of consolation as well as the reasons for our hope in years to come.

Strengths:

- **Community and Support:** Compassion, trust, and mutual support.
- **Spiritual and Ecclesial Identity:** Commitment to prayer, solidarity and presence wherever we find ourselves.
- **Leadership and Legacy:** Supportive of those who lead and serve, remembering our rich history.
- **Adaptability and Resilience:** Flexibility and balance between contemplation and action.
- **Educational and Ministerial Efforts:** Commitment to lifelong learning and outreach.
- **Interpersonal Relationships:** Strong connections and open communication.

Opportunities:

- **Community Engagement:** Strengthen relationships and increase visibility.
- **Spiritual and Personal Growth:** Embrace change and focus on personal growth.
- **Collaboration and Networking:** Work with other congregations and organizations.
- **Advocacy and Social Justice:** Use influence to speak for the marginalized.
- **Technological Integration:** Utilize tools like Zoom for connectivity.
- **Leadership and Decision Making:** Develop necessary skills and foster open communication.
- **Ongoing Formation Initiatives:** Continue lifelong learning no matter where we find ourselves and encourage others to do the same.
- **Care for Creation:** Continue environmental activism and social responsibility.

Weaknesses and Limitations:

- **Aging and Health Issues:** Physical limitations and many health concerns.
- **Leadership Challenges:** The “laborers are few” to meet all of the needs.
- **Communication and Trust:** Difficult issues, lack of transparency and trust.
- **Fear and Resistance to Change:** Reluctance to face reality and make necessary changes.
- **Resource Limitations:** Lack of personnel and need for external assistance.
- **Individualism and Inward Focus:** Tendency towards individualism and internal focus.
- **Emotional and Psychological Barriers:** Fear, hopelessness, and judgmental attitudes.
- **Geographical Distance:** Challenges in supporting members at a distance.
- **Historical and Linguistic Gaps:** Need to document the history of our second century (1965 forward) in U.S. and Brazil, language barriers.

Threats:

- **Aging and Health:** Loss of members, ageism, resistance to prepare for change and adaptation to reality.
- **Emotional and Psychological Challenges:** Fear of change and loss of hope.
- **Leadership and Organizational Issues:** Increasing needs of members and the congregation and fewer Sisters to meet the needs, indifference to the need for collaboration and cooperation with others.
- **External Political and Economic Factors:** Impact of political changes and potential economic collapse.
- **Community and Social Dynamics:** Geographical distances and isolation.
- **Cultural and Social Issues:** Threats to democracy, racism, and clericalism.
- **Internal Challenges:** Complacency and unresolved conflicts.
- **Environmental and Global Concerns:** Natural disasters and global conflicts.

Where the Spirit is Leading:

- **Embrace Change:** Be open to transformation and adapt to new realities.
- **Strengthen Community:** Foster deeper connections and support each other.
- **Live Franciscan Values:** Continue activism for justice, peace, and care for creation.
- **Address Weaknesses:** Recognize and address fears and individualism.
- **Utilize Opportunities:** Engage in dialogue and collaboration with others within and beyond the limits of the Congregation.
